History Writing Rules!

- Make sure you answer all parts of the question
- Font = Times New Roman 12pt
- Double Space
- Read your paper aloud before you submit it.
- If you hear a pause, put a comma there.
- Have someone read your paper before you submit it.
- When you first mention someone in the paper, use their first and last name. After that, just use their last name.
 - Example: Herbie Brock is one of the greatest men who ever lived. Brock, a teacher at Rockcastle County High School, is probably made of birthday cake because he is so awesome.
- Spell numbers under 100
- Don't use contractions
- Don't use forms of "I". This includes I, you, me, us, we.
- Don't ask direct questions of the reader.
- Don't say "I think". I know this is what you think because your name is at the top of the paper. Rewriting this sentence by removing the "I think" part makes it sound better, right?
 - I think that dogs are great pets. <- written by third-grader
 - Dogs are great pets. <-written by AP student

Thesis Statements:

Should be a guide for what your paper is going to be about.

Generally, a thesis statement should answer the prompt and give three reasons to support your answer.

The three reasons or 'sorgs' (statements of organization) that you give should be in the same order as your three body paragraphs.

Check out the example below:

Prompt: Is pizza awesome? Explain why you feel this way.

Thesis statement: Pizza is awesome because it is affordable, healthy and convenient.

Additionally, each paragraph should start with sort of a "mini thesis statement". This tells what that specific paragraph is going to be about.

Check out the example below:

One reason why pizza is awesome is because of its overall affordability.

Sources:

You should have two different sources for each paragraph and each source should support your reason.

These sources should just support what you are saying. They should not make up the majority of your paragraphs.

You may directly quote the source or summarize it.

Once you have used a quote, give it context. Tell why it matters and how it helps your argument.

Every source must have an author. If it does not have an author, it is not credible.

You must cite your source in the text of the paragraphs. You generally do this by having the author's last name and the page number (if available) followed by a period at the end of the sentence.

NEVER put a full website address as your in-text citation.

Check out this example:

John Adams stated in his book *Pizza and Awesomeness for the 2000s*, "The awesomeness for pizza can be found in its intrinsic value to the American people" (Adams, 72).

Credible sources generally:

Can't come from .com websites. They must be from .org and .edu websites.

Just because they are from .edu or .orgs doesn't mean they are credible.

Always have an author listed.

Are not biased.

Support their ideas with facts, not opinions.

MLA Formatting:

Here are some basic MLA formatting tips:

Use times new roman 12 point font.

Double space. If you don't know how, google it.

You have to have a header with your last name. Make sure it is times new roman. It will default to Calibri. This is a bad thing.

Your Works Cited Page must be:

On its own page.

Alphabetized by last name.

Formatted using hanging indentation. Google it. Also, the Pizza Paper has examples of it.

Complete. If you use bib.me, it might not be. Be sure it has everything it needs to have. Title, author, publication, date, etc.
